Rock On

Creatively displayed, even everyday flowers can achieve new heights. Arrange mums and berried eucalyptus in a narrow vase placed inside a wider one. For a truly dramatic effect, fill the space in between with white river rocks.



DISPLAY'S THE THING



■ A tall vase with a tapered top supports long-stemmed flowers with large or multiple blooms, such as lilies.



■ Trumpet vases work well for flowers with large heads, such as hydrangeas, or clusters of blossoms.



■ Use a bud vase when you want to showcase a single flower with a medium-size blossom, such as a tulip or rose.



■ Choose a cylinder vase for flowers with long stems and upright blossoms, such as irises or calla lilies.
